INTRODUCTION

The aim of this study is to understand the underemployed workforce in New Zealand.

Underemployment is a subset of underutilisation and is important when considering labour market productivity. On average, New Zealanders work about 15% longer than the OECD average to produce about 20% less output per person.



INTRODUCTION

This study compares characteristics of underemployed and fully utilised workers, examines how persistent experiences of underemployment are, and which individual, household, and work characteristics tend to increase the likelihood of being underemployment.



RESEARCH QUESTIONS

1. What are the characteristics of the underutilised workforce?

2. What is the transience of underutilisation?

3. What is the impact of COVID-19 on the underutilised?

DATA




Data was sourced from New Zealand's Household Labour Force Survey (HLFS) and comprises 21 quarters (2016 Q2 to 2021 Q2).

We further split the data into the pre COVID-19 period (2016 Q2 – 2019 Q4) and the COVID affected period (2020 Q1 – 2021 Q2).

The population of interest is all HLFS respondents ages 15+. Gross weekly personal income is adjusted for inflation using 2019 Q1 as the base period.









QUESTION 3 What was the impact of COVID-19?

There were minimal differences between the pre-COVID-19 and the COVID-affected periods.

It is worth highlighting that there was a decline in the share of those working as **paid employees**, and an increase in those **self-employed** with no employees, in the COVID-affected period.

CONCLUSION



This begs the question:

Is the issue underemployment, or low incomes?

When asked why they were underemployed, the majority of respondents said it was because there was not enough work available. However, it is important to note that the HLFS survey did not include "not enough income" as a potential answer.
